Request to review the decision of the Works & Infrastructure Committee meeting (15th August) for a trial closure of the intersection of Waimea Road and Hampden Street (west side).

Thank you for the opportunity to talk to you during the public forum prior to the meeting of the full Council.

I am a resident of Alfred St and regularly use the Waimea Road/Hampden St intersection. The purpose of my presentation is to request this full Council meeting reconsider the decision made at the Works & Infrastructure meeting, the request is based on four key aspects:

- 1. The appalling local community consultation carried out prior to the decision being made
- 2. The lack of consideration for the impact of this closure on some intersections and roads outside those considered in the Officer's Report and the underestimation of the impact of the closure on the nearby road network.
- 3. The choice to go straight to the road closure option when there are other options available to trial first
- 4. The potential for this to be a permanent road closure by stealth

The first thing I would like to say is that nobody wants to see any person injured on any road anywhere and I acknowledge this is a busy intersection at certain times of the day.

However, as Mr Louverdis and Ms Parfitt pointed out at the public meeting held AFTER the decision was made the accidents at this corner in the last six years involved people aged 16 to 61 and not the very young school children who use this section of the wider road network every school day.

All but one accident involved cyclists travelling down the hill outside Nelson College on the inside (kerbside) of vehicles stopped at the existing traffic lights.

Dealing with the above matters in turn:

1. The consultation carried out prior to the decision to trial a road closure

- 1.1 According to the officer's report 21 people or organisations were consulted with before the decision was made. This included some residents, the Police, Fire Service and St John as well as Nelsust, Bicycle Nelson Bays, the Automobile Association, Nelson College and Hampden St School.
- 1.2 That means only 14 local residents were consulted while the closure will have a significant impact on residents in Waimea Road, Hampden St (west), Hampden Terrace, Kawai Street, Locking Street, Locking Terrace and Alfred Street. It is simply unacceptable that all residents in these streets were not at least informed of the proposed closure and given an opportunity to comment.

- 1.3 I refer you to the process that was carried out a few years ago when Bronte St was closed to through traffic; residents in the wider area were informed, information packs about the proposed closure and reasons for it was widely circulated. Even though this is only a temporary closure why wasn't the same level of courtesy extended to the community of road users around the Hampden St/Waimea Road intersection?
- 1.4 It is very easy for council to say 'this is only a trial so we don't need to consult that widely and if council wants to close the road permanently then there is a much wider process to go through', council hiding behind a future process is seen as disingenuous and cynical consultation by local residents.
- 1.5 Of particular concern is the fact that should council decide to go through a formal process to close the road this can be done during the twelve-month trial period, and council also has the ability to extend the trial period should it choose to.
- 1.6 Local residents see this as permanent closure by stealth, I certainly feel that once it is closed it will remain temporarily closed if it is decided to go through a formal road closure process and never be reopened to traffic. (Point 4 above)
- 1.7 A public meeting was called by council staff *after* the decision for a trial closure was made, this should have been carried out prior to the decision. Mr Louverdis confirmed (as reported in the Nelson Mail 11th September 2019) that the trial would be going ahead as planned even though "Residents provided some valuable insights into traffic and pedestrian movements in the surrounding area, and in turn, council will now be adjusting where measurements will be taken to account for these areas", surely engaging with local people who use the road and intersection every day prior to making a decision would have been a wise and proper thing to do.
- 1.8 It is also worth noting a petition containing some 70 signatures from local residents was presented to Mr Louverdis at the meeting by a resident of Locking St, Mr Jim McNabb.
- 1.9 Local residents feel they were intentionally excluded from any form of consultation so there were as few opposing views as possible put before the council committee as part of the decision-making process.
- 1.10 To not consult with the owners and residents at Round Hay, just a few doors along Waimea Road, but to consult with organisations like Nelsust and Bicycle Nelson Bays shows a total lack of respect for local residents during the limited consultation process.

2. The lack of consideration for the impact of this closure on some intersections and roads

2.1 While the Officer's Report talks about the impact on residents in Hampden St (west) and Hampden Tce and also touches on the extra traffic on Locking St, Kawai St and intersections at Waimea Road/Franklin St and Kawai St/Franklin St, no consideration is given to the impact of the closure on Vanguard St/Alfred St intersection, Vanguard St/Victory Sq intersection or Vanguard St/Franklin St intersection or even the impact of extra traffic on the already busy and congested Franklin St.

- 2.2 Of particular concern is the impact on Locking St, an already dangerous and narrow shared road with no footpath. This road is already so dangerous many parents drive their children to Hampden St school rather than let them walk on this street.
- 2.3 An example of just how dangerous this road is, at the public meeting a person described how a woman was walking her dog on a short leash in Locking St recently when the dog was hit and killed by a car. Will a parent holding the hand of a child suffer a similar fate on this road when more traffic is being channelled down it?
- 2.4 As one resident in Locking Terrace (small lane off Locking St see Google Street View photo 1 appended hereto) says in an email to Ms Parfitt, "We live on Locking Terrace and received no information about the public meeting on the Hampden St West trial closure. I am unable to attend the meeting tonight, but wish to pass on my concerns.

This is disappointing as we will be affected by the closure. Our terrace turns on to Locking St, but the camber is such, that in order to turn down Locking St we have to make a three-point turn on a blind corner. It is the same if we are heading up, although sometimes we can make the turn in one go if we wheel spin. We instead opt to go towards Kawai St and out on to Waimea Rd from Hampden St, and return via Kawai St.

The problem will be exacerbated by the closure of Hampden St west, as more traffic will be channelled down Locking St making the three-point turn an even more dangerous option.

Locking St has been designed as a shared pedestrian/bike/car zone of 30kmh with traffic calming and sharrows. There is no footpath and cars are often parked on the side of the narrow street. I often walk to and from work and there are usually at least 5 or 6 people walking at the same time as me, which indicates a lot of people are walking to town.

We usually have to give way to between 4-6 cars as we walk down the street. My concern is that with more traffic driving down Locking St, it will become too dangerous and not worth walking if we have to constantly stop and give way all the way down. In a time when we should be encouraging walking/biking, this is a step backwards.

Traffic lights are the most obvious solution to this dangerous corner - and I agree it is dangerous - or if that is not an option, considering a left-turn only trial. I believe if traffic is not allowed to go straight across the intersection, that will negate the danger to cyclists."

When the writer of the above communicated with Ms Parfitt she was told by Ms Parfitt that she "struggled to understand why I could not travel to Franklin St" when I raised our camber issue - off course we can, but it just shifts the problem to another, more dangerous intersection. More dangerous in my mind as you don't have the pedestrian lights stopping traffic enabling people to turn.

Note that the writer of this statement wasn't even invited to the public meeting after the decision was made—a further example of an appalling lack of consideration to local residents on roads that will be impacted by this closure.

- 2.5 At the public meeting Mr Louverdis stated that while people may use Locking St as an alternative route they would only do it once because it is such a narrow, congested road they would be frustrated and not use it again. This is not an exact quote from him but he did use these words to outline how council staff expected driver behaviour to change.
- 2.6 His admission that Locking St is already narrow and congested is quite remarkable when one outcome of this trial closure will encourage more traffic to use Locking St, I know I will use that road when I need to go to certain businesses on Rutherford St.
- 2.7 I already avoid using the Waimea/Franklin intersection at certain times of the day because it is busier than the Waimea/Hampden intersection and is more difficult to get out of.

2.8 Round Hay

Mr Patrick Meffan attended the public meeting called after the decision to close was made and when he pointed out the 30 elderly residents of Round Hay were also vulnerable users of the road and intersection and had not been consulted at all council staff in attendance admitted it was an oversight.

- 2.9 Mr Meffan said residents of Round Hay found it much easier and safer to use the Kawai St village exit and then use the Hampden/Waimea exit than to use either the narrow drive from Round Hay direct on to Waimea Road or the Franklin/Waimea intersection.
- 2.10 Mr Louverdis suggested residents may consider driving to the Motueka St/Waimea Road intersection that is controlled by traffic lights. However, no consideration of the extra traffic on Kawai St/Tipahi St/Alfred St and associated intersections is given in the report councillors were given to make a decision on. Further, as one Round Hay resident said at the meeting "If I drive to Motueka St it feels like I'm already half way to Richmond so may as well go there to shop."

2.11 Exiting Waimea Road to Franklin St

All of the focus of the staff report seems to be on traffic exiting and entering Hampden St from Waimea Road but no consideration is given to traffic turning right from Waimea Road to Franklin St. This already congested intersection that is one of the key roads into the public hospital will change from being busy and often dangerous to a simple nightmare.

- 2.12 Franklin St is already a narrow road, there are a huge number of residents in Franklin Hall (who also weren't consulted) and the hospital has just created more on-site parking that will use their Franklin St entry/exit.
- 2.13 Franklin St is also heavily used by a group identified as vulnerable users, school students, who go to and from the Broads playing fields.

2.14 Alfred St/Vanguard St intersection

Again, no consideration was given in the officer's report to the impact of the closure on this intersection. (photo 2 appended hereto)

- 2.15 At busy times when the school crossing is operating, particularly on wet days, traffic already backs up along Vanguard St to the bottom of Alfred St. If traffic can't use the route via Alfred St to Waimea Road and needs to carry on along Vanguard St to Franklin St then the queue of traffic on Vanguard St will most certainly reach the already dangerous Victory Square intersection on Vanguard St.
- 2.16 Another matter that hasn't been addressed in the officer's report is the impact on more traffic passing Victory School on Vanguard St to access Franklin St. It is already very busy with kids entering and exiting the school and there is a lot of traffic for Nelson Intermediate passing through the area. These may be considered 'unintended consequences' that are uncovered during the trial period but they shouldn't be, they are very obvious matters that should have been considered before the decision to close the Hampden/Waimea intersection on a trial basis.
- 2.17 As with Waimea Road, when traffic does back up cars leave a gap for traffic exiting Alfred St to cross Vanguard St, this creates an identical situation council is trying to mitigate on Waimea Road but on a much narrower road with even less visibility.
- 2.18 When Sue McCauley contacted me (after my appearance at the full council meeting public forum was confirmed) to see if she could address my concerns her stony silence when I asked about this intersection made it clear the impact on it hadn't even been thought of let alone considered and she admitted there had been no traffic counts done on Vanguard St. I note traffic counts were carried out in the last couple of weeks.
- 2.19 At the public meeting Mr Louverdis told those in attendance the purpose of the trial closure was to see what the impact would be on the roading network and it had to be for twelve months so there was time for people to change their behaviour with regards to roads they use.
- 2.20 To me this says that rather engage in meaningful public consultation with people directly impacted by the closure council will just close it and see what happens. That is unacceptable.

The choice to go straight to the road closure option when there are other options available to trial first.

- 3.1 The report to the Works and Infrastructure Committee gave three options, temporary road closure, partial closure of Hampden St west, and do the minimum by extending the on-road cycle lane, removing parking spaces and extending no stopping lines.
- 3.2 It is worth noting at the start that option 2, partial road closure, was the preferred option for the Fire Service and St John but St John would support either option.

- 3.3 It is also worth noting the schools prefer the option of installing traffic lights on the intersection. While it may be an expensive option council has been aware of the issues with this intersection for many years and has had a decade or more to build this cost into its plans and hasn't done so. It is the best option for the wider local community.
- 3.4 Of course closing the road will see the end of accidents on the west side of the Waimea/Hampden intersection, but it will do nothing to improve the safety on the east side of the same intersection.
- 3.5 It appears that the main cause of accidents relates to cyclists travelling down the hill towards the city in the cycle lane when the crossing lights are red and vehicles stop, leaving a space as required by the yellow cross-hatch road marking, and vehicles then turn across the intersection into Hampden St west.

Cyclists are often hidden behind the queue of vehicles stopped for the red light.

- 3.6 This brings me to the point of personal responsibility for all road users.
 Just as motorists have a responsibility to wear seat belts, obey road rules, drive with due care and attention and be courteous of other road users, cyclists have the same responsibilities wear safety helmets, obey road rules, ride with due care and attention and be courteous of other road users
- 3.7 Every road user has a duty of care to not put themselves in a situation that is dangerous to themselves and other road users.
- 3.8 The proposed so-called temporary road closure will cause a huge impact on nearby local roads and residents because, in the main, some cyclists don't take some personal responsibility for their own safety.
- 3.9 There is a councillor around this table who has had cycle accidents and he has openly admitted he either wasn't paying attention to judder bars in a school car park or was over-extending his abilities on a mountain bike. Other cyclists also need to take personal responsibility for their actions on and off the road.
- 3.10 This road closure reinforces and encourages the attitude of many cyclist on our road, some seem to think they have a God-given divine right to cycle where they want, whenever they want, as fast as they want and how ever they want.
- 3.11 Some cyclists seem to think road rules don't apply to them and closing this road will not stop this group of road users from riding through the red lights on Waimea Road when pedestrians are crossing the road.
- 3.12 The group of road users who have had the vast majority of accidents (11 out of 12) at this intersection are cyclists and they need to take some personal responsibility for their own safety.
- 3.13 The road is clearly marked, most cyclists who use the road regularly are very familiar with the intersection and should know they need to cycle with caution when the red lights are operating at busy times.

3.14 Rather than going straight to the road closure option it is my opinion council should have trialled better signage warning cyclists to watch for crossing traffic in the first instance.

Finally, I would like to comment on the emotive language used at the public meeting, several times those in attendance were told no one wants to see accidents that cause injury or death at this intersection with a verbal emphasis on the word 'death'. There have been no deaths at this intersection and suggesting such is pure conjecture as turning traffic is generally travelling very slowly.

As I said at the start, nobody wants to see another human being injured on any road but we also need to take into account the cause of the injury accidents at this intersection and consider other ways of mitigating the danger without transferring the same or similar issues to other roads and intersections.

I ask that this full council reconsider the decision made by the Works & Infrastructure committee and either improve warning signs for cyclists or change the road closure to a left turn only option with a medium-term (say three years) commitment to installing traffic lights at the intersection.

Hi, my name is Alicja Maslowska,

I am here today because I am a survivor of a crash at the Hampton Street/Waimea Road intersection.

I feel really stressed to be here to speak in public, however I feel I have a responsibility to stand up and share my experience with you all.

After 2 operations, a long recovery time, financial loss due to time off work, and having to give up on my cycling, I can tell you that I still feel the effects of that accident every time I pass that intersection.

To the nay-sayers who say "oh, just another cyclist and it's not the intersection it's the cyclist" I can tell you that I did everything I could to stay safe at that intersection:

I was on the cycling line. I was not going fast. I kept to a safe distance from the following bike and I was wearing high Vis clothing.

Despite all the effort to be safe and responsible I was still hit by the car, through no fault of my own.

It is a dangerous intersection and one where drivers are impatient when it is busy.

It is dangerous for drivers, cyclists and pedestrians and a number of these users are children. Surely they would be a primary concern for everyone.

Will it take a death for something to be done about this intersection?

I believe the original plan for Hampton Street Road closure is a socially responsible and sensible action.

Thank you for listening to what I had to say.

Council boss's goals must be visible









Last column, I canvassed the need for increased transparency for our elected councils. This time around I will highlight what I think the single best way of doing that is.

In considering what elected councils actually do, it is important to remember that their crucial legal role is as the governors of our district and city. And it's also worth thinking about what the most important decisions they might make truly are. No, it isn't the amount that our rates rise every year!

Because an elected council can legally only directly control one person, the chief executive officer, it is crucial they put considerable effort into getting that right.

Also, what they determine are the most important things facing the city should be reflected in their management of the chief executive.

Realistically, there is no other way of getting their political decisions carried out. Key performance indicators (KPIs) should be set that require the chief executive to deliver those key results. Equally, such KPIs should be unambiguous and very clear as to how the council will know whether the results have been achieved or not.

Real accountability will come when these KPIs and the resulting performance are published for us all to see.

Having clear KPIs for the chief executive allows him or her to set effective KPIs for senior managers and all other staff to ensure that meeting those KPIs is a focus for all council staff.

Accordingly, the links between the overall long-term plan and annual plan direction, chief executive KPIs, senior manager and staff performance, and the overall organisation's results ensure alignment.

Therefore, the single most important decision the people we elect face every year is in setting and determining the chief executive's performance criteria. The KPIs set by the council describe what "successful performance" actually means.

In setting such KPIs, the council is giving a clear direction and a mandate to the chief executive as to the relative priorities for the year ahead. It is essential, therefore, that the KPIs clearly reflect what the council wishes to see by way of results. This simple act of setting and determining the KPIs is the single best measure for us to be able to judge how well our elected councils are governing our city and district. Accordingly, the management of the chief executive's performance should be made public and transparent.

For true accountability, the KPIs should be made public ahead of the period to which they relate.

Actual performance against those KPIs should then be reported annually in the formal annual report of council at the end of the period.

Doing this has the advantage of serving as a very good means of us being able to see the governance focus and issues facing each council.

Furthermore, the requirement for publication in the annual report allows the auditor-general to scrutinise both the measures used and the performance achieved, and thus gives us more confidence over how our elected council is managing their most important task. In that sense, the chief executive's KPIs must be set at the same time as the annual plan is struck for the year ahead in order to reflect the priorities in that plan.

Overall performance against the KPIs is judged after the end of the financial year once the actual results are known.

All KPIs should be expressed in a manner to allow assessment as either "achieved" or "not achieved".

The intent behind this approach is deliberate in order to ensure clarity over what is required, and also serves to remove any ambiguity or debate over whether KPIs have been achieved or not.

Using this approach, both the council and the chief executive (and we ratepayers!) are very clear as to what constitutes a "good" result.

Assessing overall performance is a complex task. For example, if 10 KPIs were set and only eight achieved, would we consider this successful performance or not?

One of the achieved KPIs may have been so successfully achieved that it completely outweighs the non-achievement of all the others.

Equally, some KPIs may be deemed to be more important than others and a failure to achieve even just one of these particular KPIs can be seen to be "unsuccessful performance" irrespective of whether others were achieved or not.

While some KPIs may be "not achieved", the reasons behind that may represent extraordinary circumstances, and so the simple fact of a KPI being "not achieved" does not necessarily mean the chief executive is not successfully performing.

Like no other decisions made by elected councils, this process of setting KPIs for the chief executive and of the monitoring of the results achieved serves to highlight either the good or bad governance practice on the part of the people we elect to govern on our behalf.

It is the single most important decision they make, bar none. It is the principle measure of their competence to govern. It is crucial we have visibility over this.

Right now, that isn't the case. The number of councils publishing their chief executive's KPIs or the results achieved against those KPIs is vanishingly small.

When I was at the Nelson City Council (NCC), we did that as a matter of course – both in the annual plan, and in the attendant annual reports.

At that time, NCC was one of just two councils nationwide to do so. Sadly, that practice has stopped.

Under the new law changes that empower mayors, it becomes even more essential that we can see just how effective their governance is – and that transparency will largely come from being able to see how they manage the performance of the council chief executive.

Complete package key to organisation's success



(http://www.nelsoncitycouncil.co.nz)A complete cultural shift across the whole of the Nelson City Council has resulted in significant improvements both internally and for the Nelson community.

Four years ago, before the Council was to appoint a new Chief Executive, the Executive Team had some candid discussions about the purpose of the organisation.

Roger Ball, Acting Executive Manager Community Services, and Hugh Kettlewell, Executive Manager Support Services, said they began by asking themselves what we are aiming for. "Why do we get up and come here every morning?"

Although individual parts of the organisation were functioning well, Mr Ball says the Council operated through an accumulation of processes that had been incrementally tinkered with over a long period of time. "And doing the same thing better was not going to be sufficient."

The conversation resulted in a desire to see the organisation aligned from top to bottom, heading in the same direction and committed to the same purpose. And that purpose was to make Nelson a better place, with an explicit focus on success.

Effective = "Did you get the outcomes you planned to get." Efficiency = "Minimum use of resource to achieve those outcomes."

After appointing their new Chief Executive Officer, Keith Marshall, the role of the entire Executive Team was re-written. Their positions were reframed, with the aim of departing from silo-oriented divisions to managers of the Council as a whole.

Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) were then agreed on, which included customer satisfaction, staff engagement, compliance, and capital expenditure.

"Nothing new in having KPIs, of course, but where Nelson City Council stepped outside the box was in making them publicand including them in the current annual plans and annual reports."

The Council then moved further towards aligning the organisation by linking the Chief Executive Officer's KPIs with those of individual staff. By reframing the performance management system, all staff were held to account for achieving the Council's goals.

"We shifted our focus from 'how do I make my department or role work more efficiently' to 'how does the organisation meet the needs of the customer?'"

And it seems they are. Over a period of four years, there has been a 44% increase in customers who highly rate the service they received. Mr Ball says a crucial tool for driving cultural change in the organisation and helping to build cohesion around their purpose has been a leadership programme, delivered to all staff from the Chief Executive Officer down. This programme includes a two-day seminar, ongoing coaching, buddy mentoring, and monthly "get togethers" to embed the cultural shift into the organisation.

Although the alignment package has delivered some impressive improvements in effectiveness, Mr Ball says they are not holding themselves up as a model for other organisations to emulate. He says many of the project's initiatives were not new to local government. However, he attributes the project's effectiveness to the fact that the complete package was tailor-made specifically for the Nelson City Council.

Mr Ball is confident, however, that the premise the changes were based on can be transferred to other organisations.

"In our experience, efficiency and effectiveness is not so much about one or any number of projects or initiatives," he says. "It is about organisational focus, alignment, and a shared vision made real."

Background	Following several serious accidents and many more near misses at the intersection of Waimea Rd and Hampden St West; Nelson City Council has agreed to close Hampden St West to through traffic on a 12-month trial basis. The aim of the trial is to make the area safe for pedestrians and cyclists, and to gather data to inform good decision-making for the future of the intersection. Following the trial, the data and community feedback will be reviewed, and a range of permanent options considered such as potentially re-opening the road with additional safety measures e.g. traffic lights, one-way rules or turning restrictions.

Addendum to the Mayor's Report

4. Annual Plan Climate Change Update

- 4.1 As part of the Annual Plan process Council approved \$30,000 for establishment of a climate forum and climate taskforce. Progress with the Climate Forum is gaining traction with the community and Council is in the process of providing a grant of \$10,000 to support the initial set up costs.
- 4.2 Interested members of the community are in the process of establishing a Working Group. Membership of the Working Group has been discussed with the Nelson and Tasman Mayors and invitations are going out at the moment. The role of the Working Group will be to draft a Climate Charter and organise a Climate Summit before the end of the year. The thinking is to model the Climate Forum on the Nelson Biodiversity Forum. Any group or individual that signs up to the Climate Charter at the Summit would be able to participate in the Climate Forum. Council's funding of \$10,000 would go mainly towards a facilitator and the costs of the Summit.
- 4.3 TDC and MDC have been invited to participate in the Forum and both are interested.
- 4.4 The Te Tauihu Intergenerational Steering Group has enthusiastically endorsed the establishment of the Forum and Working Group.
- 4.5 In addition, recruitment for the Climate Change Champion is progressing well.

5. LGNZ Conference Pledge to Support Te Tiriti o Waitangi

- 5.1 All Councils at the LGNZ conference were asked by Te Maruata Chairperson, Bonita Bigham, to make one new commitment to supporting Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Pledges where placed in sealed envelopes and collected in a kete.
- 5.2 At the Council meeting the Mayor will outline the pledge that she made on behalf of our council. It builds on the positive mahi of Te Wiki o te Reo Māori.

6. Recognition of Council Service

6.1 The Mayor will outline the custom of Nelson City Council in recognising service to Local Government for those who are retiring and for those who are seeking reelection.

7. Recognition of Community Service

7.1 From time to time the Mayor recognises service to the community with certificates to both individuals and groups. The Mayor has noted that the Santa
